You are champions of handling what 'change' might bring and are leaders in our United Church of Canada by saying 'yes' to innovative ministry. Blessings on your journey!

UCM 2024 Annual Meeting Minister's Report

Dear UCM Family,

This is my last report to you as your minister, as I will be retiring this coming summer. And so I want to leave you with a few of my impressions about the work we've done together, and some insights for the future from gathered wisdom.

The most important learning from being with you in this model of collaborative ministry is that the 'myth' of things staying the same has been shattered. In 2018, you came together as six congregations. Today, you are four congregations. And you have experienced adjustments in the funding formulae as a result and are accommodating any changes this brings to your financial picture.

In 2023, the congregation of St. Andrew's in Beaverton met several times to grapple with their future. It was the most Spirit-led and deeply moving experience to be a part of their struggles, their honest conversations, and the obvious sense that they would make the decision to close and amalgamate with Trinity. Many of the congregation transitioned to their new spiritual home in Trinity United, Cannington, now known as Trinity-St. Andrew's. And I can tell you how the vibrancy of that move has impacted the Trinity congregation. There are more people in the pews, there are new members in the choir and handbell choir, their leadership team has been enhanced. And the outreach work of St. Andrew's, known as Andy's 2.0, came over to Cannington and continues to thrive as an outreach ministry to provide meals for those in need in Beaverton. Additionally, because of the amalgamation, Trinity had to let go of its Affirming status, one that had identified this congregation for several years as an inclusive, welcoming congregation. But they rolled up

welcoming congregation. But they rolled up their sleeves and got back to the work of doing the Affirming process again, 2.0 version. This coming June 1, that congregation will vote to become an Affirming congregation, and it will be even more beautiful because of the conversations held in the last year, and the celebration of achieving this work together, with your Beaverton congregation. Peniel's funds from the sale of its building have given Woodville a more secure financial future, and this in time will make its presence known in decisions they make to serve their community, with replenished sources. Oakwood works within its means and continues to thrive as a church within its community, offering dinners, and plant sales and musical concerts. Cambray also continues to do what it loves best, meeting together as family and caring for each other with compassion and joy.

The collaborative garden plot project goes into its 3^{rd} year this summer and will be a budget item for 2026. It is the most remarkable way to demonstrate what a collaborative ministry can do – for when you join together, you can do more. Food banks in your four communities will receive fresh produce that has been planted, watered, and harvested by gardeners from your four churches. I am disappointed that I have not been with the UCM long enough to see what might happen to the structure of the collaborative if a new church was invited into the collaborative. There would be a shift of energies and relationship, and I believe this would be a good thing for you to experience. We can become closed-minded when we get too used to what we're doing. God is not here to keep us complacent but rather to nudge us forward into what I keep calling, the 'next expression of being church'.

You are on the forefront of this work in our Region. You are indeed a 'success' story if one can grant that label to a collaborative. But your work is not done. It continues to want to move into this next 'expression.' Your geography will change over time. As a church enters in, or perhaps one closes, the 'shape' of your collaborative will be redrawn. And the collaborative will adapt to this change, by *not* saying for example, "Oh, it's too long a drive between points" and shut down the conversation. You never know what the Spirit is up to, so try saying instead, "Let's try it and see where it goes."

And one other observation I've been mulling over. If one of the UCM congregations decides to close down and not amalgamate, and they choose a path of existing until the last person out the door turns out the lights, how does the UCM walk alongside this partner church on their journey, that could be called 'palliative.' I often think of the UCM as being a 'living entity' and I am curious to know how the partner churches would respond to 'one of its own' making this journey. How will they walk alongside this congregation? Will they check in and bring the proverbial 'plate of muffins or casserole,' or will they just walk by and not look in. Something for the UCM to ponder.

It has been an honour and a privilege to serve as your minister for four years. I have deeply enjoyed my work and friendship with the

remarkable Kerri Jebson, Chair of the UCM

Council, whose 'secret superpower' is her ability to run any meeting in under 45 minutes. And my gratitude for the excellent work and much needed support of the duly unflappable Ruth Fallding, UCM Team Administrator. My thank you to the friendships I've found with the LLWLs who anchor the UCM with their worship ministry, faith, and caring to your congregations. The other 'bulwark' that is so needed for this collaborative to function as smoothly as it does, is the flexibility and competency of the Secretaries who weekly work with a different worship leader and yet continue to present worship bulletins for you that capture all of the different styles of your worship leaders. And to our musicians, who go with whatever hymns we send them, thank you from the bottom of my heart for going with this stream of variety!

I hope that my legacy to you has been one of consistent leadership and presence, both in your

congregations and your leadership teams. And I know that your next minister will take you to a new place of understanding what collaborative ministry can be about, and that together, you will move into the 2030's with confidence and amazement at what God has done!

I remember when I first saw the posting for the UCM up on Church Hub. My heart literally skipped a beat because it was so exciting to think I could possibly do this kind of ministry. Thank you for giving me this unique opportunity to be a part of what God is up to in 'churchland'. What a wonderful way to conclude my ministry with the United Church of Canada!

Bear Witness

The Witness Blanket is a powerful art installation created by master carver Carey Newman to recognize the atrocities of the residential school era, honour the children and symbolize ongoing reconciliation.

Inspired by a woven blanket, this cedar- framed artwork is made of hundreds of items from residential schools, Survivors, churches, governments and other cultural sites across Canada. Each item tells a story of loss, strength, resilience and pride.

The Witness Blanket is NOT a blanket!

However, much like a family quilt, it is made of various panels, each telling its own story. The many panels bear Witness to the Residential School Survivors. Each of the 889 pieces of history, which make up the panels, was salvaged from Residential Schools all across Canada. A shoe, a bell, a door knob, a braid of hair and more all tell a story. The yellow plastic mush-bowl, from the Mohawk Institute in Brantford, was used as a reminder of food, whether there was ever enough and the quality of the mush/porridge. Maggots and sour milk were often served.

The Witness Blanket is almost 40 feet long (12 meters) and 10.5 feet high (3 meters) made of Red Wood Cedar from British Columbia. Some of the panels weigh over 300 lbs. When assembled, the 13 panels weigh more than 2 tons (1.8 metric tons). Artist, Carey Newman, lives on northern Vancouver Island and made this display as a tribute to his father, a survivor, and as a reminder to all in Truth and Reconciliation.

As we often wrap ourselves in a blanket for comfort, the Witness Blanket is meant to be a reminder that Residential Schools will never happen again and our Indigenous Brothers and Sisters can take comfort in that fact.



Trinity UC Cannington has been approved as a host community venue for the public display of the Witness Blanket (Sept 8 to Oct 15, 2025) that is touring Canada.
